
Deeper Connection Study

This section closes what is known as the infant narrative of Luke 1-2 (though Jesus is 12 years old in this scene). It is a pronouncement about Jesus - his character and mission. It informs us that Jesus has not only been raised by his parents to honor and love God, he has a special relationship with God the Father. Herein we see evidence of Jesus understanding his purpose in life. *Today's Core Practice discussed:* **Bible Study**.

Read Luke 2:41-52

- 1. Why did Jesus and his family travel to Jerusalem (vv. 41-42; cf. Deut. 16:1-6)? Why was this event important?
- 2. How long did Jesus remain in the city before he was found (vv. 43-47)? What was he doing there and how did people view him? How did his parents react (v. 47)?
- 3. What does Jesus reveal about his understanding of his mission in life and the unique relationship to his Father (v. 49; cf. 1:32, 35)? How does his explanation affect his parents (vv. 50-51)?
- 4. What is mentioned about Jesus' growth as a young man (v. 52; cf. v. 40)? What contributed to his development?
- 5. What words would you use to describe your growth in the Lord? How are you seeking God?
- 6. How do you pursue time with God? What are your priorities in regards to your faith, ministry, and life? How does your life demonstrate time spent with God?

PRAYER TO THE POINT: Praise God for his favor and the wisdom he gives. Pray for consistent and meaningful time with God. Pray for your growth in the Lord, asking God to fill you with wisdom and grace. Ask God to deepen your understanding of him.



n his first epistle, Peter makes this assertion:
But in your hearts revere Christ as Lord. Always
be prepared to give an answer to everyone who asks you
to give the reason for the hope that you have. But do this
with gentleness and respect, keeping a clear conscience
so that those who speak maliciously against your good
behavior in Christ may be ashamed of their slander," (1
Pet. 3:15-16 - NIV). The word "answer" is the Greek word
"apologia," which is where we get the word apologetics.
It seems that in the 21st century, many Christians are not
"prepared to give an apology" for the hope that they
have, and the few that do often fail to do so with
"gentleness and respect."
